Crop Check - Moree

CROP STAGE -

- Crops are finishing slowly
- Defoliation: Later crops and some double skip still to get their first application. Most crops have had 2 passes, but hormone damage causing some angst, expecting 3 or more passes to get the leaf off
- I know of one crop picked in the valley, but most won't get the pickers in for a couple of weeks and all hope to be finished by end June
- Is some double skip and semi irrigated cotton that probably won't get picked until late June

INSECTS/BENEFICIALS -

- Large spiders and cotton strainers
- Insect pressure has been relatively low all season

WEEDS -

- Odd noogoora burr and sesbania in irrigated fields
- Feathertop Rhodes grass common on fallows (See CottoInfo FactSheet: FTRG)

DISEASE -

- Vert is rampant in some fields. (Verticillium wilt in cotton https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=hgiatA52nNw)
- Also seeing senescence and Sclerotinia (Sclerotinia in cotton https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=yt 542Kj3 0)
- Boll rots common

What the consultants are saying:

"Crops finishing slowly, only 25% of my crops have had their 1st hit (defoliation)".

"Defoliation is going slowly, expect to do 3 passes (hopefully no more) with picking starting in 2-3 weeks and hope to be finished by end of June".

"Defoliation to start next week, anticipate 3+ passes. Seen plenty of 2,4-D drift. Won't be picking until June".

"All of my cotton has had 2 passes, but with hormone damage, leaf is frozen on top and will definitely need another pass, hope to start picking mid may".

Day Degrees 1st Nov 2019 – 25th April 2020




Figure 1: Accumulated Day Degrees 2019 DD 1532, 2018 DD 1532, 2017 DD 1532 compared to Base12

CSD Ambassador Update:



End of Season and segmented picking is underway in the CSD Ambassador fields and Variety Trials. With crops 4 to 5 weeks later than normal, we're still waiting on top bolls to open before this will be complete. The first Variety Trial (at Red Mill) should be picked on Monday the 4th, which we're all eagerly awaiting to see the results of the experimental variety CSX3006B3F. The earlier maturing characteristic of this variety has been evident at the end of the season, as shown in the photo below.

Verticillium wilt population and V-rank trials are also being stem cut and assessed in the Gwydir and Namoi – we should hopefully see some useful results given the incidence of the disease this season.

Have your say - Cotton Research Priority Survey 2020

Cotton Australia would like to give you an opportunity to identify research priorities for investment over the course of the new Cotton Research and Development Corporation (CRDC) strategic plan (2018-2023).

To assist in providing this advice, Cotton Australia and CRDC have designed a simple survey for all members of the cotton industry to complete.

This survey is an important step in ensuring all members of the cotton industry have an opportunity to provide input on priorities for industry investment through CRDC in the areas of research, development and extension.

It should only take approximately 5 - 10 minutes to complete.

Cotton Australia will report the full survey results to CRDC and will provide valuable feedback to CRDC on investment priorities. Results will also be communicated back to industry via the CGAs and Member Organisations (such as CottonInfo).

To start your thinking process, in 2019 the survey showed the following issues were priorities across all growing regions (*in no particular order*):

increasing disease prevalence, water availability/improved water use efficiency, social licence, traceability, soil constraints/soil health, climate change, sustainability, nutrition, energy costs, labour availability, spray drift, pests – SLW and mealybug, biosecurity, weed and pest resistance, access to digital technology and cover cropping.

The figure below shows the key roles of industry organisations. CRDC no longer invests in plant breeding or varieties. This is done through Cotton Breeding Australia. Please keep this in mind when thinking about research priorities for CRDC.
