SEASON SUMMARY

Yield results coming in are still much the same as last update with around the 9-11 bales/ha commonplace with the odd one up to 13 bales/ha although these are estimates in the paddock and not post ginning. In saying this picking is really only just starting to get going and the rain and colder weather has slowed it up further. Only a couple of millimetres in the Namoi generally in the last change with Bellata around 25mm and Moree through to Croppa Creek 25-50mm. Not much rainfall on the Liverpool Plains with 6-20mm with the best falls closer to Quirindi.

Dryland crops down on the Liverpool plains have been reasonable for the season with the odd crop over 4 bales/Ha and 3 bales/Ha the average. Ian Gourley has one of the new baler strippers at Edgeroi at the moment in his dryland crop yielding around 1.1 bales/Ha.

Ginning is only just starting in this area and on the deliveries so far reports are that modules are a

little heavier than last year but of those ginned turnout has been back a little and this makes sense as the heavier modules are on account of a difficult defoliation and less lint as a total ratio. The later crop is expected to be better yielding as it was able to finish its top crop in more favourable conditions.

TRIALS

Soil sampling on the Verticillium rotation trial is underway with a few more treatments. A new biofumigant plant mix which includes Mustard is being trialled and forage sorghum was incorporated into an existing trial plot.

The row configuration trial at Auscott Narrabri had the 1st defoliation on last week. It was originally a dryland trial but ended up with 4 irrigations so it is now a semi-irrigated trial.

The exclusion tents came off at "Rossmar Park" and as you can see we did change the growth pattern of the crop and fruit counts under the

tents showed up to 30% less fruit, sorry Angus!. This project idea is being looked at now by the whole Cottoninfo team and it will be rolled out across all valley's next season.

COVER CROPPING

An interesting article in the Cotton Wire put out by Trevor Johnstone today where trials are being carried out by the Agricultural Research Service in Alabama USA with cover crops. They trialed the planting of cereal rye in Autumn then spraying, rolling and planting cotton with the one pass for 3 seasons against the traditional 2 pass method of spraying then planting later. Costs were less and cotton yields were 2.5% higher for the 3 years of the trial. The really interesting part was the comparison of costs used a diesel price of \$2/gallon and wages of \$12.55/hr.

The latest from the ENSO prediction has scientists backing off from the strength of the El Nino for 2017. However, the warming in the central Pacific is shaping up more like a 2002 or 2006 event with what's termed the El Nino 'Modoki' phenomenon.
