November 2022

What's been happening?

Planters have been going around the clock in between rainfall events to get cotton seed in the ground. Some growers on the Liverpool Plains are yet to have an opportunity to plant given the rain. A few comments from some Wee Waa growers; "the cotton has emerged really well", "just need to touch up some tail drains where water backed up", "seed quality held up in the worst of conditions". From what I have seen, the emerged cotton looks good considering the conditions we have experienced over the past month. Plant stand is even, and the crop is relatively healthy – anywhere from emergence to 4 true leaves.

Weather

Another rainfall event at the end of October has the Namoi River surging yet again. Last week, Wee Waa was cut off at Glencoe channel for the 5th time in just 2 months. The Kamilaroi Highway currently remains closed in the West of the valley from Burren Junction all the way to Bourke (as per livetraffic.com).

The long range outlook included in the latest CottonInfo Moisture Manager, (released 31/10/2022) tells a story of the La Niña conditions currently peaking and breaking down at the beginning of Summer.

Given the ongoing flooding situation across the region, I urge you to keep in contact with your local CSD Extension & Development Agronomist for assistance with **cotton replant decisions.**

Total rainfall for October as per local Airport Weather Stations (sourced from Bureau of Meteorology 10/11/2022).

(Please note this includes rainfall received overnight 31/10/2022 to 9am 01/11/2022).

- Bourke: 186.4mm - Narrabri: 188.2mm

- Walgett: 126.4mm - Gunnedah: 192.6mm

Wee Waa: 230.8mm - Quirindi: 169.5mm

Nutrition Webinar - In Case You Missed It!

Jon Baird, Graeme Schwenke and Chris Dowling shared their knowledge on nutrition management for this season. As we all know, fertilising fields ahead of planting has been a challenge this year and we spoke to the experts on how to manage the nutrition program. Topics discussed include Nitrogen

management in a wet year, nitrification inhibitors, timing of application, N mineralisation in a cold year, and where is my soil N?

Seeing yellow on the first true leaf? This is an early indication that your soil N might be elsewhere within the profile and not at the root zone.

Bug Checkers Workshop – Save The Date!



Late Plant Cotton Considerations – How Late is too Late?


Last week, CottonInfo and Cotton Australia hosted a webinar on Late Plant Cotton Decisions.

Speakers included Dr. Michael Bange and Bob Ford (CSD). Topics discussed were planting date, yield, row configurations and some budgeting factors.

Demonstrations were presented using the OZCOT crop simulation model developed by Dr Brian Hearn for CSIRO. The example below irrigated cotton at Spring Ridge, shows the average yield for each planting date as well as the 20% and 80% probability of exceeding this.

Note the sharp decline in yield as we move towards December planting dates.
